# WARRIORS SUMMER LEAGUE NOTES

- Seven of the Warriors 15 Summer League players have at one time in their careers spent time in the NBA D-League:
  - ◆ Played in D-League last season (3): **Will Blalock** - Maine, Reno, Anaheim and Sioux Falls;  
**Reggie Williams** - Sioux Falls; **Jeremy Wise** - Bakersfield.
  - ◆ Previously played in D-League (4): **Andre Brown** - Sioux Falls and Austin; **Brian Chase** - Roanoke and L.A.;  
**C.J. Giles** - Sioux Falls and Los Angeles; **Kasib Powell** - Sioux Falls.
  - ◆ The Warriors tied an NBA record with five D-League Call-Ups last season (Reggie Williams, Anthony Tolliver, Cartier Martin, Anthony Tolliver and Coby Karl), and the Warriors have had very good success with bringing up D-Leaguers who are able to contribute in the NBA (Kelenna Azuibuike is a four-year veteran and C.J. Watson is a three-year veteran).
  
- Nine of the Warriors 15 Summer League players have at one time in their career played professionally overseas:
  - ◆ **Will Blalock** - Artland Dragons (Eurocup); **Andre Brown** - Zhejiang Wanma (China), Leones De Ponce (Puerto Rico), Al Jalaa (Syria), Banvit (Turkey), Daegu (South Korea), Incheon Et (South Korea), Euro Roseto (Italy), BC Budocnost (Serbia) and Barangay Ginebra (Philippines); **Brian Chase** - Valladolid (Spain), Le Mans (France), Dynamo (Moscow) and Besiktas Cola (Turkey); **C.J. Giles** - Al Riyadi (Lebanon) and Smart Gilas (Asia); **Joe Ingles** - CB Granada (Spain) and Melbourne South Dragons (Australia); **Kasib Powell** - Trikala 2000 (Greece), Zhejiang (China), Spartak (Russia), Reflex Beograd (Yugoslavia) and PAOK (Greece); **Jason Rich** - Maccabi Haifa (Israel) and NGC Cantu (Italy); **Tremaine Ford-Townsend** - USK Praha (Czech Republic); **Ben Woodside** - Gravelines (France).
  
- Second Time Around:
  - ◆ This will be the second consecutive summer that Australian forward Joe Ingles will appear on the Warriors Summer League Roster. Ingles appeared in all five of the Warriors games in 2009, averaging 3.2 points, 4.2 rebounds, 1.2 assists and 1.6 steals in 25.6 minutes.
  
- Brotherly Love:
  - ◆ Warriors guard C.J. Watson will see his younger brother, Kashif Watson, suit up for the Warriors Summer League team in 2010. Kashif attended Idaho University for his final two years of school and appeared in 62 games while averaging 10.5 points, 3.2 rebounds, 2.4 assists and 1.0 steals in 29.6 minutes. The Las Vegas, NV native will get a chance to return home to play in front of friends and family during Summer League play.
  
- The Walking Wounded Return:
  - ◆ Brandan Wright, who missed the entire 2009-10 season after injuring his left shoulder in training camp, will make his much anticipated return in a Warriors uniform during Summer League.
  - ◆ Anthony Randolph, who suffered a left ankle injury in 2009-10 and was forced to sit out the final 47 games of the season, will also return to action during Summer League play.
  - ◆ Golden State was hit with another injury when Ekpe Udoh, the 6th overall pick in the 2010 NBA Draft, suffered a left wrist injury during a supervised workout with teammate Stephen Curry and Summer League teammate Joe Ingles at the Warriors facility on July 4. The injury will force Udoh to miss the 2010 NBA Summer League.
  - ◆ The Warriors were the most injury-depleted team in the NBA last season (501 games lost due to injury) and it was the second most injuries by any team since the NBA began tracking this in 1986.
  
- Following in Dad's Footsteps:
  - ◆ Stephen Silas will be the Warriors head coach at Summer League for the first time in his four-plus seasons with Golden State. However, it won't be the first time Stephen takes the reigns of a summer league team, being that he served as Summer League head coach for the Cavaliers in 2003 in both the Boston and Orlando leagues.
  - ◆ Stephen's father Paul Silas was a head coach in the NBA for 10 seasons with the Cleveland Cavaliers, New Orleans/Charlotte Hornets and San Diego Clippers. Paul Silas also spent 16 years as a player in the NBA (1964 through 1980), posting career averages of 9.4 points, 9.9 rebounds and 2.9 assists.

# WARRIORS SUMMER LEAGUE NOTES (CONT.)

## ■ Last summer, the Warriors Made an Impact on Summer League:

- ◆ Randolph averaged a league-high 26.8 points per game over four contests, including scoring 42 points in a victory over Chicago on July 14.
- ◆ Morrow, who appeared in the final three games of summer league after missing the first two with a sprained left ankle, averaged 24.7 points which was good for second best scoring average among all players...Morrow averaged 13.5 points in his first two games before erupting for an all-time Vegas Summer League record with 47 points against the New Orleans Hornets on July 16. (See box scores from both games below)

## ■ USA Basketball Comes Calling:

- ◆ Stephen Curry, who will be working out in Vegas but won't appear at Summer League, was invited to join the USA Men's Basketball team this past year. The National Team will hold their mini-camp from July 19-24 at the Thomas & Mack Center in preparation for the 2010 FIBA World Championships that start in late August
- ◆ In 2009-10, Curry became the first ever rookie to shoot 45% from the field, 40% from 3-point range and 80% from the free throw line as well as setting the all-time rookie mark for made three-pointers with 166.

## ■ Reggie's Excellent Adventure:

- ◆ Reggie Williams was Called-Up from the D-League on March 2, 2010, and he made an immediate impact on the team.
- ◆ Williams scored in double-figures in 19 of his 24 games, including scoring 20-plus eight times. He averaged 15.2 points per game and shot 49.5% from the field with Golden State. Another interesting note, once Reggie joined the team, the Warriors had the players who led the NCAA in scoring in each of the past three years (Curry led nation in 2008-09 at Davidson while Williams led nation in both 2007-08 and 2006-07 at VMI).

# SUMMER LEAGUE HEAD COACH

## STEPHEN SILAS

Stephen Silas, 36, completed his fourth season as an assistant coach for the Golden State Warriors, marking his ninth season overall as an NBA assistant coach. With the Warriors, Silas concentrates on the development of perimeter players as well as game preparation and managing the team's offensive and defensive playbook.

Prior to joining the Warriors, Silas served as an advance scout for the Washington Wizards during the 2005-06 season after spending five seasons on the coaching staffs of his father, Paul Silas, with the Cleveland Cavaliers and the New Orleans/Charlotte Hornets. The younger Silas served as an assistant coach for the Cavaliers during the 2003-04 & 2004-05 campaigns, where he was charged with individual skill work, player development, game preparation, pre-game walkthroughs as well as managing and developing technology and NBA scouting systems for the coaching staff. Silas also served as head coach for the Cavaliers 2003 Summer League teams in Boston and Orlando.

Silas also spent three seasons as an assistant coach with the Charlotte Hornets prior to joining the Cavaliers. At the time of his hiring as an assistant with the Hornets on June 5, 2000, he was the youngest assistant in the NBA at the age of 27. Silas originally joined the Hornets in the summer of 1999 as an advance and college scout, scouting nearly 200 NBA and college games in that role. He also served as the head coach for the Hornets Summer League squad at the 2002 Orlando Summer Pro League. In addition to his work with NBA teams, Silas coached at the 2003 and 2007 NBA Pre-Draft camps.

Internationally, Silas has worked at many camps and clinics across the globe to help promote the game of basketball and the NBA. This past summer, he served as coach at the Korea Development Camp in Seoul, South Korea, working in conjunction with the NBA and Korean Basketball League. He served as a coach at the NBA's Basketball Without Borders camp in Africa in the summer of 2008, as well as in Beijing, China during the summer of 2005. He also represented the NBA Coaches Association at the Dirk Nowitzki Basketball Academy in Berlin, Germany, in July of 2004.

The Boston native graduated from Brown University in 1996 with Bachelor's Degrees in sociology and management. He played four seasons for the Bears basketball team. Upon graduation and before joining the NBA, Silas spent three years as the assistant executive director of the National Basketball Retired Players Association (NBRPA) in Providence, Rhode Island.

Silas and his wife, Keryl, were married in 2002 and are the proud parents of their two daughters, Kyler Elyse and Kaelyn.

# SUMMER LEAGUE COACHES

## KEITH SMART - ASSISTANT COACH

Keith Smart recently completed his seventh season as an assistant coach for the Golden State Warriors, giving him the longest tenure of any assistant coach in Warriors' West Coast history. Overall, 2009-10 marked his 10th season as an NBA assistant coach and his 21st year of professional basketball experience as either a player or coach.

Among his many duties at Golden State, Smart continues to work closely with players on individual skill development and game strategy. He has served as the head coach of Golden State's summer league entry in Las Vegas for each of the past three seasons and has assisted the Latvian National Team for each of the past two summers, helping the Latvian team, led by Warriors' center Andris Biedrins, qualify for EuroBasket 2009 in Poland.

Smart, 45, joined the Warriors prior to the 2003-04 campaign after spending the previous three seasons with the Cleveland Cavaliers. He was named the Cavaliers interim head coach in the middle of the 2002-03 season (January 20, 2003), and posted a 9-31 record in 40 games after taking over for John Lucas. At the time, he was the second youngest head coach in the NBA, trailing only Eric Musselman. During his first two-plus seasons in Cleveland, Smart held the position of assistant coach/director of player development.

Prior to joining the Cavs, Smart spent three seasons as the head coach of the CBA's Fort Wayne Fury, compiling a record of 85-83 (.506) and guiding the team to its first back-to-back winning seasons in franchise history in 1997-98 and 1998-99. In his first campaign as a head coach at any level in 1997-98, he guided the Fury to a franchise-record 31-win season and a trip to the playoffs. The club made the playoffs again in 1998-99, despite having a single-season franchise record nine players signed to NBA contracts. He was awarded the American Conference Coach of the Month Award five times during his tenure with Fort Wayne and had a CBA-high 21 players signed to NBA contracts.

In the summer of 2005, Smart served as the head coach for the Dominican Republic National Men's Basketball Team, which was the host squad for the 2005 FIBA Americas Championship. During the tournament, he led the Dominican squad to a 6-5 record and sixth-place finish in the 10-team tournament.

During his professional basketball playing career, Smart spent six seasons in the CBA, two seasons in France and one in Venezuela. Smart also played briefly in the NBA, appearing in two games for the San Antonio Spurs during the 1988-89 season.

Smart was originally drafted by the Warriors in the second round (41st overall) of the 1988 NBA Draft. As a collegiate player, he spent two seasons at Indiana University after earning Junior College All-American honors at Garden City (Kansas) Community College. He is widely remembered for his Final Four heroics in 1987, in which he was named the Most Outstanding Player of the Final Four after leading Indiana to a National Championship with his game-winning shot versus Syracuse in the title game. Smart earned a B.S. in Communications from Indiana in 1998.

Born on September 21, 1964, Keith and his wife, Carol, have two sons, André and Jared. They currently reside in Dublin.

## SCOTT ROTH - ASSISTANT COACH

Scott Roth, who owns 25 years of professional basketball experience as a player, coach and scout, completed his first season as an assistant coach for the Golden State Warriors in 2009-10.

Roth, 46, most recently served a one-year stint as the head coach of the NBA Development League's Bakersfield Jam during the 2008-09 season, leading the Jam to a 26-24 record and the team's first-ever D-League postseason appearance. He was also head coach of the D-League Select Team at NBA Summer League in Las Vegas this past summer.

A Wisconsin native, Roth began his NBA coaching and scouting career in 1996 with the Dallas Mavericks, where he briefly served as the team's director of scouting before moving to the bench. Overall, he has logged six seasons as an NBA assistant coach, working with the Mavericks from 1996-2000 and the Vancouver/Memphis Grizzlies from 2000-2002. From there, he served four-plus seasons as a scout and advisor for the Milwaukee Bucks before being named head coach of the Bakersfield Jam.

In addition to his NBA and D-League coaching experience, Roth served as head coach for the Dominican Republic National Team in 2007 & 2008, highlighted by a silver medal finish at the CBC Caribbean Championships held in Puerto Rico, a pre-qualifying tournament for the World Championships. He also coached the Turkish National Team in the 2001 World Championships in Indianapolis and spent the summer of 2000 coaching the Turkish team to a silver medal in the European Championships in Istanbul, Turkey.

Following a standout playing career at the University of Wisconsin, Roth was drafted in the fourth round of the 1985 NBA Draft by the San Antonio Spurs before beginning his professional career in Europe with Efes Pilsen of Turkey. He then played three seasons in the NBA from 1987-88 thru 1989-90, appearing in a total of 160 games with the Utah Jazz, San Antonio Spurs and Minnesota Timberwolves. Roth continued playing professionally in Europe from 1991-95 before beginning his coaching and scouting career.

Roth and his wife, Lorie, have a daughter, Dene.

# Despite Setback, Blalock Chases NBA Dream

Will Blalock was fresh off his second season as a professional basketball player when his life unexpectedly took a detour. The former Iowa State star guard, who played one season for the NBA's Detroit Pistons (2006-07) and in stints in the NBDL and Jerusalem, was attempting to make an NBA comeback. As the Boston, Mass., native was boarding a plane at Logan International Airport destined to Seattle for the Sonics mini-camp, he noticed something was wrong with his body.

"It was crazy. I was on my way to mini-camp and I was getting ready to fly out," Blalock recalled. "I was on the phone and next thing I knew I lost feeling on my whole left side of my body. I was not able to function right. I remember closing my eyes and when I opened them back up, I knew something was wrong. I could not feel the left side of my body. I couldn't stand up and I couldn't feel my arms and my legs."

At the tender age of 24 and in prime physical shape, Blalock had suffered a stroke.

"They rushed me to a hospital, and after they did all the tests on me, they told me I had a mild stroke," Blalock said. "I was on a whole bunch of medication and was in and out of the hospital. I had to take blood thinner because I had a blood clot in my neck, which caused the stroke. After that, I was not able to play for close to six months."

A well-conditioned athlete like Blalock, who was drafted in the second round by the Pistons in the 2006 NBA Draft after an outstanding ISU career, is not thought of as your typical stroke victim.

However, dealing with complications from a stroke hasn't been the only health ailment Blalock has had to fight in his life. Most Cyclone fans are unaware that Blalock is a life-long sufferer of asthma. It's something he has had to battle throughout his career since he was diagnosed with the condition as a child.

"I had terrible asthma and it is still a struggle," Blalock said. "I have had it since I was five years old and it always gave me trouble when the seasons change and still to this day it does. I have to bring a pump around with me during the day and get hooked up onto a machine at night. It is tough sometimes, but for basketball it does not hold me back. I get tired just like any other human."

ISU fans still reminisce about the jet-quick Blalock leading the Cyclones on the break during his three years in Ames from 2004-06. His uncanny ball-handling skills and dazzling no-look passes helped the Cyclones advance to the 2004 NIT semifinals and the second round of the 2005 NCAA Tournament. He is a member of ISU's prestigious 1,000-point club (1,078) and still ranks fifth all-time in school history in career assists (464) and sixth in career steals (177).

Despite his setback, Blalock is not ready to give up on his dream of playing in the NBA again. He is making an extraordinary recovery, but it hasn't come easy.

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Blalock's break from basketball allowed him to reflect on his playing days at Iowa State. The 2004-05 season is special to Blalock. ISU began the season 0-5 in the Big 12, but bounced back to win seven-straight games, including a historic win at No. 2 Kansas, to sneak into the NCAA Tournament.

"That was a huge year for us," Blalock said. "I remember it like it was yesterday. I will never forget what we did as a team that year. I remember my sophomore year a lot when we made that late run and all that stuff. I miss those days." A couple of games from his freshman year also trigger happy emotions for Blalock. He had a hand in the Cyclones' 68-61 win over No. 15 Kansas and was a key part of ISU's win over No. 11 Texas (78-77).

"The game against Kansas at home my freshman year when I came off the bench and had 11 assists with no turnovers is one of my favorites," Blalock said. "Then when we beat Texas when they were ranked really high in the country and the kid (Brian Boddicker) missed the free throws at the end. I don't think I ever heard Hilton any louder."

For now, Blalock is ready to get back onto the court and resume his basketball career. It's been a tough journey, but the point guard has worked vigorously to regain his physical condition and is eager to start competing again. He will get his chance this summer.

"Now I am back healthy and I want to give the NBA another shot," Blalock says. "I am working out in Chicago right now preparing for NBA Summer League. At the end of next week, I am going to Indiana for the Pacers camp and then at the end of the month I have another mini-camp in Cleveland. I will play Summer League for Indiana in Orlando and then I will play for the Cavs in Las Vegas. If I don't get picked up by an NBA team, I will probably go back over to Europe with another team."

He will certainly have a legion of Cyclone fans rooting for him.

## Chase Tries To Capitalize On Chance

There were nights when Brian Chase came home to his family's cramped, two-bedroom apartment in the Trinidad section of Northeast and saw nothing but darkness, when he couldn't shower or flush the toilet because the water was cut off. His mother was sometimes gone for several days pursuing her next fix. And, if he hadn't borrowed money from friends, Chase may not have been able to buy food for himself and his younger siblings.

"It was a terrible, terrible situation," Chase, a point guard for the Washington Wizards' summer league team, said earlier this week about his upbringing. "I wouldn't want my worst enemy — if I had one — to be in that situation."

Chase, 25, has survived his share of trials, which is why he is relishing his situation as a member of the Wizards. He has played sparingly through the first two games in Las Vegas, scoring just five points in 31 minutes, but Chase won't complain. "I'm on cloud nine right now," he said. "This is something only a few people get an opportunity to do — especially from my neighborhood."

Chase said he remembers taking the bus each day to a summer job as a teenager, right past the construction area that would eventually become Verizon Center, never imagining that he would be playing in any capacity — summer league or regular season — for his hometown team.

It seemed inconceivable. And, if not for one fateful night when Chase was 13, it may have never happened at all. Chase was hanging out with friends when rivals from another neighborhood came seeking revenge for an earlier altercation in which Chase wasn't involved. Chase had his back turned and heard gunshots. A bullet hit him in the leg and lodged in his thigh. The bullet remains today as a reminder. When he left the hospital, Chase told his mother, Catreeda Lloyd, that the shooting was "a sign."

After being shot, he knew he had to change his life. Chase said he wasn't involved in any illegal activities, but if he had continued hanging out with those who were, it would have happened eventually. "I was pretty much becoming a product of my environment. I didn't need to be ripping and running around acting like a knucklehead."

He committed himself to basketball, ditching the corner to shoot hoops at Anacostia Park or Trinidad Recreational Center.

Inspired by her son's turnaround, Lloyd soon made a heartfelt, tearful pledge that she would clean up her life, stop abusing alcohol and drugs, and enter a detoxification program.

"A lot of things we were faced with at that time, it gets me kind of choked up," Lloyd said in a telephone interview, adding that she hasn't had a drink in 12 years. "It was a rough time in our life and he had a willingness to persevere. He wanted better. He wanted more. I've made a lot of progress in my life. I told him his [life] better be better."

NBA Summer League rosters are filled with drifters who have bounced around nearly every no-name minor league, hoping for their shot. Chase is no different. He was first-team All-Met as a senior at Dunbar and twice led the Big East Conference in three-point accuracy at Virginia Tech. He also had a brief stint with the Utah Jazz and others with teams in the NBA Development League, United States Basketball League, Continental Basketball Association and American Basketball Association.

Generously listed at 5 feet 9, Chase compensates with speed and a sweet jump shot.

He took a break from basketball after his career ended at Virginia Tech in 2003. Chase received no offers to play basketball in the United States and turned down opportunities to play abroad because of his then-infant daughter, Laila, now 3. The snub gave him an opportunity to return to school and finish his degree in human services. “My whole life, I’ve pretty much been the underdog — written off a little bit,” Chase said. “Mainly because of my size, I never got the recognition I wanted.”

On the local street ball circuit, though, Chase’s exploits are well known to those who follow the action of the Kenner League at Georgetown’s McDonough Gym or the Goodman League at the Barry Farms outdoor courts. Chase has won five titles and was named most valuable player of the Goodman League last season.

Miles Rawls, longtime commissioner of the Goodman League, gave Chase the nickname “The Fast and the Furious.” “He’s got a big rep in the city,” Rawls said. “Once you come down there and get a name, you’re good to go. He’s one of my favorite guys in this town.”

Chase was teammates last summer on a Barry Farms team that featured Wizards Gilbert Arenas, Caron Butler and Andray Blatche, among others. When he received an invitation to training camp with the Jazz last year, Chase approached Arenas and said, “I want whatever you got.”

Arenas invited Chase to work out with him every day, and Chase was up for the challenge. “What better way to get ready for anything than with an all-star, a guy you know for a fact stays in the gym every day, who some people would call crazy with the way he works out?” Chase said. “He got me ready for Utah. That sent me over the top, that I know I can do it on this level.”

Chase was a member of the Jazz for the first seven games last season but never played. After he was released, he spent the rest of the season with the Los Angeles D-Fenders of the NBDL.

“I’ve been through a lot and I always tell myself, ‘God’s got something really special in store for me.’ It’s happening right now,” Chase said.

# Rainier Beach center C.J. Giles a quiet giant

For so many years, C.J. Giles kept everything inside.

When he was young, and the constant moving made him long for a permanent home, there was no one to confide in. When he first enrolled at Rainier Beach, uncertain of what a new school and a new team would bring, he simply left his feelings unacknowledged. And even on the basketball court, where his lean, 6-foot-11 frame towered over opponents, Giles preferred to let his play do most of the talking.

But this quiet giant ended up in the spotlight after all.

As he embarks on what should be a successful senior season on the Beach basketball team, Giles has finally learned that letting people in can make all the difference.

He talks candidly about basketball, family and life. His voice does not waver. He does not look down or swallow his words like he once did.

“As a captain, I’ve got to be more vocal because I really don’t talk a lot,” he said one day after practice. “I feel more confident. I think sometimes other people call me soft because they’re intimidated by me and want to get in my head. But I’m not, and I show that on the court.”

On the court, Giles is a rarity — a center who can run the floor and hit jumpers with the confidence of a guard. Under the basket, he is an imposing presence for even the most experienced post players. He is scoring 16.8 points per game this season and the nationally ranked Vikings (8-2 overall, 6-0 Metro) will rely heavily on him as they try to become the first Class 4A or 3A boys team in state history to win a third straight basketball title.

But it has been a long road of uncertainty and bottled-up feelings to get to this point.

Giles did not play organized basketball until ninth grade, despite standing 6-4 at the time. His father, Chester, played for Kansas but never pressured his kids into trying the sport.

“I let my kids follow their own lead,” he said. “C.J. just wasn’t interested in basketball until ninth grade.”

C.J., who was named after his father (his initials stand for Chester Jarel), says his lack of interest had a lot to do with uncertainty at home. Before sixth grade, Giles said he moved nearly every year, from mom to grandma to dad, and never knew if his next stop would be permanent.

He calls the early years with his mother, Gail Giles, “rough” and does not have much of a relationship with her now. She pops up at games and practices every now and then, but they do not talk regularly. Like Chester Sr., Gail also played basketball for the Jayhawks.

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“My childhood, I basically kept everything inside,” Giles said. “My sisters were older than me so I couldn’t talk to them and my dad was too busy working. I could only talk to my little brother.”

He credits Rainier Beach coach Mike Bethea and athletic director Dan Jurdy with providing the family-like setting that allowed him to open up. But adjusting to the fast tempo and high expectations of Beach basketball took a bit of time.

“When I first got here I was real intimidated and I was all bony,” Giles said. “I was like, ‘Man, am I really ready to do this? Can I handle this?’ “

Bethea thought so.

He often says Giles is part of the legacy of talented players produced by the school in Seattle’s Rainier Valley.

“The twins (Lodrick and Rodrick Stewart) handed him the torch,” he said, “and now he’ll pass it on to the guys coming after him.”

One of those recipients is starting point guard Terrence Williams, a junior who considers himself a brother to Giles.

“He was tall and he was quiet,” Williams recalls of his first impression of his teammate. “I think he got more comfortable when he got around us. He’s starting to be more consistent. He’s starting to realize that he’s the tallest guy in Metro.”

Giles acknowledges his potential to do more than he has in the past and has no doubt that his team will be successful this season.

“We’re going to be the first (3A or 4A) team in the state of Washington to win the championship three times,” he said, cracking a smile.

Next season Giles will attend the University of Miami on a basketball scholarship. Just as exciting as playing in the Atlantic Coast Conference is the prospect of being joined by his father and younger brother, Malcolm, who plan to move with him before the start of the school year.

Through those years of unspoken emotions, Malcolm, a sophomore at Federal Way’s Todd Beamer High School, was the only person his brother really talked to.

“I try to be everything to him,” Giles said.

He does not want Malcolm to ever feel as alone as he once did, to hold things inside. So he sees the move to Miami as a new beginning.

“I feel like it’ll be a new life for us,” Giles said. “I think it’s a new start.”

# Tired Joe Ingles waits on NBA draft call

South Australia's Joe Ingles has done everything in his power to pursue his National Basketball Association dream.

The Croweater, 21, left "knackered" by three months of working out in front of scouts, now is waiting in the U.S. to hear his name called in tomorrow's NBA draft.

At best, Ingles has been touted by U.S. basketball scribes as a late, first-round pick but the South Dragons championship forward is more likely to be snared in the second round just as fellow South Aussie Brad Newley was taken at No. 54 by Houston in 2007.

"I think second round is a realistic scenario, not too much more," Ingles' Australian-based manager Paul Bell said. "That's where he's been talked about for a while.

"There's been whispers of him being late first-round. That would be the best-case scenario. We'll have to wait and see what comes out of it."

After travelling the U.S. showing his wares in front of several NBA clubs, Ingles turned his attention to five-on-five trials at the NBA's International camp in Treviso, Italy and more recently, in New Jersey.

"His first couple of games in Treviso he didn't shoot the ball overly well," Bell, from MVP Sports, said.

"But there were a couple of reasons for that. He'd been doing all these individual workouts for a couple of months but he hadn't actually played any five-on-five since the (NBL) grand final.

"By the third game he shot the ball really well and then he had a reasonable workout in New Jersey which was a similar five-on-five format in front of about 22 NBA teams."

Bell's American partner is gathering all the feedback on Ingles. While there have been differing levels of interest from several teams, Ingles' chances of realising a childhood dream are up in the air.

"There will be a lot of craziness between now and Friday and, to be honest, it's out of Joe's hands now because all of his workouts are completed," Bell said.

"I know he's pretty tired and knackered. He's been going for a couple of months. Now he's looking forward to seeing what happens.

"If he was to get drafted it would be the culmination of a childhood dream. The NBA is what everyone who picks up a basketball aspires to."

Ingles is one of four Australians in the draft pool, with fellow Boomer Patty Mills also a strong chance to be drafted. West Australian Luke Nevill and Queensland's Aron Baynes are other hopefuls.

## Kasib Powell: CBA all-star aims high

The NBA likes players that fit into neat boxes - pure point guards, true centers and the like.

That can make it difficult for a guy like Kasib Powell - who at 6-5 has played everything from point guard to power forward for the Dakota Wizards this season - to get a break.

Yet Wizards coach Dave Bliss says Powell is not a dreaded "tweener." "He's a defensive stopper - that's his position," Bliss said.

Bliss likens Powell to Bruce Bowen, who did his time in the CBA and overseas before becoming a vital contributor to the NBA champion San Antonio Spurs.

"I'm a big fan of Kasib's game, but you appreciate him more, the more you see him play," Bliss added. "Once he gets up there, he's going to stay awhile." Powell will get a chance to showcase his skills tonight in Boise, Idaho, at the CBA all-star game. It will be Powell's second all-star game appearance, as he earned a spot last season while playing for Great Lakes.

"There's a lot of scouts - pretty much every team was there last year," Powell said. "The atmosphere was good. It's just exciting to play in an all-star game." Powell's scoring numbers are virtually identical to last year, 17.9 points per game with the Wizards compared to 18.1 for Great Lakes. But he has increased his rebounding (7.0), assists (5.0) and steals (1.6) this year.

And Powell has done it while doing anything asked by the Wizards - and they have asked a lot, from running the point when fellow all-star Maurice Baker was on an NBA tryout to playing down low when injuries decimated Dakota's frontcourt.

"When people see things like that, they get to see more of my game," Powell said.

A 24-year-old from Teaneck, N.J., Powell played at Butler (Kan.) Community College before signing on to play for Bob Knight at Texas Tech. Powell said those two years provided a Basketball education.

"It was a good experience, playing for him," Powell said. "It really helped me in the future, certain things that he taught me helped me at the pro level and give me an edge up on some people.

"- He can kind of get in your face and yell, scream, and some people think he's a bad person," Powell said. "But he's like that because he pushes you to get so much out of you." Powell has made several stops in his pro career, including playing in Greece. Last season he helped lead Great Lakes to the best record (28-20) in the Eastern Conference, but while playing for the Storm, Bismarck caught his eye.

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“Last year playing against the Wizards, I knew that if I came back to the CBA, I wanted to come to the Wizards,” he said. “I knew how the crowd support was around town, and knew they had the best fans, if I came back.

”- Great Lakes was kind of an awkward situation, because even though we were winning a lot, a lot of people still didn’t come to the games,” he explained.

Powell nearly didn’t have to make that choice. Powell was the last player cut by the Chicago Bulls. The season before he was the last player dropped by Minnesota.

Powell thinks that showing he can play point guard should help raise his NBA stock, but he knows being more consistent with his shot is his real ticket to the big-time. So far he is shooting 51.2 percent from the floor this season.

”When you’re trying to help somebody with their shot, you try to help them however you can to develop confidence,” Bliss said. “If you don’t develop confidence, then you’re going to be hesitant.

”What you want is to get his athletic ability flowing,” Bliss added. “Sometimes when you’re struggling, you try to play place the ball in the basket, rather than just cracking it, rather than letting your athletic ability put the ball in the basket. There have been periods where Kasib has demonstrated great consistency with his shot, and we want that to spread.” While Powell’s individual performance has been outstanding, he has been unsatisfied with Dakota’s 13-13 record. Like other players, he says it’s hard to put a finger on why the team is struggling, but hopes the all-star break offers the Wizards a chance to regroup.

”I think we’ve showed we can play at times, but we’ve had our struggles,” he said. “We need to play more steady, not be a good team one, and a mediocre team the next. We need to focus on finishing games out.” While acknowledging that the right offer from a foreign team can lead to a change of plans, Powell says he plans to stick out the season with the Wizards in hopes of getting his chance in the NBA.

”As long as I’m getting better, and my game is getting better, I’m happy,” Powell said. “If an NBA team calls, I’ll be ready.”

## Warriors' Randolph looks long on talent

As Anthony Randolph tried to squeeze his long, lean frame into a booth at P.F. Chang's this week, his fellow restaurant patrons gave him little more than a he-must-play-basketball glance. A week removed from his 20th birthday, Randolph can easily be mistaken for a local college player. One season with the Golden State Warriors has hardly made him a recognizable face, even in the Bay Area.

But if Randolph's recent performance in the NBA's summer league is any indication, the locals will know him well soon enough.

Randolph averaged a Vegas summer league record 26.8 points, along with 8.5 rebounds, 3.0 blocks and 2.3 steals. In a game against the Chicago Bulls, he scored 42 points. Los Angeles Clippers rookie forward Blake Griffin was named the summer league's Most Outstanding Player, but it was Randolph who had most league executives and scouts buzzing with his quick first step, fearless dunks, improved jump shot and all-around versatility.

"He's the real deal," gushed one Western Conference scout. "He reminds me of Lamar Odom."

Randolph is generating equal parts praise and regret from rival teams, many of who passed him over in last summer's draft. Though he fell to the Warriors at No. 14, Randolph now looks capable of joining Chicago Bulls point guard Derrick Rose as one of the top two elite players of the 2008 class.

Randolph's improvement over the second half of last season had already begun to open eyes, including several pairs on his own team. Warriors coach Don Nelson was hard on Randolph, whose work ethic was openly questioned to the point that rival teams said Golden State made him available in trade talks.

"In January, they would've given him away for a bag of balls," one West executive said. "By March, you couldn't touch him."

After averaging 7.9 points, 5.8 rebounds and 1.17 blocks last season, Randolph was back in the gym just three weeks after the Warriors failed to make the playoffs. He worked on his shooting and ball-handling, and just as importantly, spent considerable time in the weight room.

"He almost died doing that," Warriors assistant coach Keith Smart said of Randolph's workouts. "I went to watch him at one of the local colleges and he had nothing in the tank."

The hard work has paid off: Randolph, who was listed as 6-foot-10, 205 pounds last season, has since added about 10 pounds of muscle and is said to have also grown an inch. Warriors officials think there's room for both his frame – and game – to expand.

"I don't know where the ceiling is for Anthony, but it's awfully high," Warriors general manager Larry Riley said. "... He's probably about two years away from being as good as he can be."

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Scouts think Randolph's all-around skills will enable him to play like a point forward in the Warriors' go-go-go offense. As one East GM said, "he's perfect for Nellie's system."

While it's not etched in stone until Nelson says so, Randolph is expected to start for the Warriors at power forward next season. Warriors officials have downplayed their interest in Utah's Carlos Boozer, and while the team did have conversations with the Phoenix Suns about acquiring Amare Stoudemire, those talks have since cooled. For now, the Warriors seem intent on giving Randolph every opportunity to prove he is ready to start.

Randolph, in turn, has been wise to keep his summer-league success in perspective. That 42-point performance? "I was mad after the game," he said, "because I only grabbed three rebounds."

Randolph is well aware that few summer heroes become legends of the fall. "Von Wafer and Marcus Banks, they are all-right players, but not All-Stars," Randolph said of Wafer and Banks, both of whom had previously scored 42 points in a summer league game. "It doesn't really mean you're going to have a great season."

USA Basketball officials, however, were impressed enough. They added Randolph to this week's minicamp in Las Vegas, where some of the NBA's top young players hope to compete for roster spots on the national team for the 2010 World Championships in Turkey. Randolph will face long odds in making the cut for next summer or for the 2012 Olympics. Still, he's determined to use the minicamp to not only prove he should some day wear the red, white and blue, but also show that his summer league dominance wasn't a fluke.

"You have to respect everybody, but at the same time you have to go at them," Randolph said. "They're blocking my path to where I want to go to. I look at them as a wall that I want to go through."

If it's stardom that Randolph hopes to reach, he's already made some modest progress. As he walked out of P.F. Chang's after dinner, a young woman shyly approached him and said, "Hi, Anthony." Soon, she had gathered her girls to take a photo with him.

Randolph smiled. Eating his shrimp dumplings in peace might not be so easy next summer.

I realize that I am going into my senior season and that makes me want to work even harder than I have during the first three years of my career. I then hit the court for individual workouts at 4:30 and we bring pick-up as a team at 5:30. It's a full day and I have really tried to be consistent with my schedule throughout the entire summer."

What is one thing that is standing out about the team this summer?

"The one thing that really stands out about this team during the summer is that there seems to be more chemistry between all of our players than there has been in the past couple of years. There is a sense of cohesiveness; we understand that for us to be successful as a team we have to do things as a team. There is no one person who is going to be able to do everything like we have had in recent years. This is going to have to be a team effort for us to be successful. # He bears watching: Baylor's Ekpe Udoh shows his versatility

Ekpe Udoh always tried to maximize his learning opportunities, whether the lessons involved life or basketball.

Now, the Big 12 is learning quickly that the Baylor power forward brings far more game than anyone expected when he transferred from Michigan.

Call it a crash course.

The 6-10 Udoh has recorded 10 double-doubles in 16 games at Baylor, giving the No. 25 Bears a far different look this season going into tonight's game with third-ranked Kansas. His inside presence at both ends of the court complement Baylor's top perimeter threats, LaceDarius Dunn and Tweety Carter.

As expected, Udoh delivered rebounds (11.4 per game) and blocked shots (4.4 per game), ranking in the top 10 nationally in each category. Baylor, which struggled to break even with opponents on the boards last season, now tops the nation in rebounding differential.

Yet the biggest surprise has been his offensive production. After averaging 5.5 points in two seasons at Michigan, Udoh now provides 14.1 points per game.

Baylor discovered Udoh's latent offensive ability early in his transfer season.

"There were times in practice where he was dominant on the offensive end and hard for us to stop," Baylor coach Scott Drew said.

Udoh spent the whole season trying to improve. He had learned the importance of effort from watching his Nigerian immigrant parents, Sam and Alice, strive for a better life in Edmund, Okla.

"My parents put in a lot of hard work to get as a family to where we are now," Udoh said. "That's probably where my work ethic comes from."

Udoh spent last season working with assistant Matthew Driscoll, now the coach at North Florida, developing offensive skills in the low post.

He had never been a big scorer, not even at Edmund's Santa Fe High School. At Michigan, he wasn't a great fit in John Beilein's system when Beilein replaced Tommy Amaker.

"At the end of my sophomore year, I just didn't think I was going to be able to reach my full potential," Udoh said. "We came to an agreement that it was best for me to move on."

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He narrowed the list to four schools: Arkansas, Baylor, Oklahoma and Oklahoma State. Baylor's stock rose when Udoh immediately struck up a relationship with Carter.

"I was coming to school with a true excellent point guard," Udoh said. "I knew I had something to work with." Carter saw Udoh's immediate potential.

"He worked every day. Every day," Carter said. "As a point guard, I just couldn't wait to play with him. And now it's here."

People have noticed. After Udoh recorded the fifth triple-double in Baylor history with 18 points, 17 rebounds and 10 blocks in a win over Morgan State, coach Todd Bozeman proclaimed him an NBA prospect.

Udoh "will be playing 82 at some point," Bozeman said, referring to the length of the NBA season.

Colorado coach Jeff Bzdelik, a one-time coach of the Denver Nuggets, told the *Denver Post* that Udoh "is going to be making a lot of money very soon." Online mock draft sites have him projected in the first round.

He's become a crowd favorite. Udoh wears No. 13 because his middle name is Friday and has been nicknamed "The Nightmare."

Scouts will no doubt be taking a close look at Udoh's NBA potential tonight against a Kansas front line led by 6-11 Cole Aldrich. Kansas coach Bill Self marveled this week at Udoh's physical development since high school.

Udoh, a junior with one season of eligibility remaining, has tried to channel the attention in a positive way.

"It makes me really work harder so more and more people can talk about me and our program," Udoh said. "I sit down and read it, and say. 'That's good.'"

# D-League call-up has persevered

For Reggie Williams, Sunday's whirlwind of emotion started in a Des Moines, Iowa, hotel.

"Coach called me down to his room, and I was thinking, 'What did I do wrong?'" said Williams, who instead of being reprimanded, was informed that he was getting called up to the Warriors. "My aunt couldn't speak, my father said he was buying 'NBA League Pass,' and my nerves have been jumping ever since."

Williams, who had 10 points, five rebounds and five assists, in his NBA debut Tuesday, is the Warriors' league-record-tying fifth NBA Development League call-up this season.

He joined a Warriors lineup that just learned it would be without Monta Ellis and Andris Biedrins - each of whom is expected to miss the entire five-game road trip with injuries.

Williams, a 23-year-old swingman, got only mid-major and Division II offers out of a Virginia high school. He went to VMI, where he became one of only nine players in history to lead the nation in scoring in back-to-back seasons. He went undrafted, then had to watch 15 D-Leaguers get a shot before he got called up from the Sioux Falls Skyforce.

"It's very hard, especially when you play against those guys," Williams said. "You're asking, 'Why can't I get that shot?' You feel like you've played those guys and out-played them, but you're not getting a chance."

Williams wasn't even the Warriors' top choice this time. They wanted to sign 6-foot-11 Courtney Sims from the Iowa Energy, but the 2008-09 D-League MVP signed to play in Puerto Rico days before the Warriors called.

"Mostly my whole basketball career has been in an underdog role, so it's nothing new," Williams said. "I want to prove that I can play here, that I belong with these guys. There are some guys who proved that if you come up here and play well, the Warriors will give you a chance to stay."

"It gives you hope."

## Reggie Williams: 2010's Biggest D-League Success Story

In what has been a banner season for the NBA's D-League — with a record 23 players getting called up to the bigs — no one has been more of a success story than Reggie Williams.

The Virginia Military Institute alum was dropping 26 points a night for the Sioux Falls Skyforce when he was brought up by the Golden State Warriors in early-March, and has stuck with the team ever since, averaging 14.9 points per game and cracking the starting lineup. In late-March, Williams was signed for the remainder of this season and the next, at a base salary of around \$760,000 next season.

In the most recent issue of Dime, I profiled Reggie while he was still getting buckets in Sioux Falls, S.D. Just days before we sent the mag to print, he got his call-up. So the photo that ran with that article is apparently the last time you'll ever see him in a minor-league uniform ...

In a way, Reggie Williams is a basketball purist. Not that he pores over footage of the 1962 Celtics or reads John Wooden strategy books, but more because he represents the fundamental basis of the game: Get more buckets than the other guy.

Williams puts the ball in the basket for a living. At Virginia Military Institute, the 6-6 swingman was the NCAA's single-season scoring leader two times — dropping 28.1 points per game as a junior and 27.8 ppg as a senior — one of only nine players to ever accomplish that feat. He is also the all-time leading scorer in the Big South conference. Undrafted in 2008, Williams played one season in France (13.5 ppg), and this year is lighting up the scoreboards in the NBA Development League for the Sioux Falls Skyforce. As of early-March he was second in the D-League in total points, and third in scoring average at 26.4 points a night.

But NBA scouts already know Williams can score, and it hasn't been enough to earn him a secure spot in the League. So now he's looking to prove he can do other things on the court, as well as shake the notion that he was merely a product of VMI's highly offensive dribble-drive motion system.

“I think that's totally false, that I'm a product of the system,” says Williams, 23. “Look at the stats from my freshman and sophomore years in college, when we weren't playing that (DDM) system. I averaged 15 my freshman year and 19 my sophomore year. I've always been able to score with any team I've played on.”

As for the rest of his game, Williams was averaging 5.5 rebounds, 3.2 assists and 1.6 steals per game at press time. He's also been efficient, hitting 57 percent from the floor and 82 percent at the free-throw line.

Williams grew up in Prince George County, Va., where he lived on the Fort Lee military base due to his father's veteran status. Reggie wasn't a big-time recruit at Prince George High School, which he chalks up to not playing much AAU ball and having some trouble with his grades and the SAT. He chose VMI over Coastal Carolina, Radford and Longwood.

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“The military aspect didn’t have anything to do with going to VMI,” Williams says. “And it didn’t make it any easier. My Dad actually wasn’t a really strict military guy. He was an inner-city kid who grew up in Detroit. He traveled, so he wasn’t home a lot. I had my freedom growing up, so having people yelling at you (at VMI) to do this a certain way or do that, I had times when I wanted to leave.”

The fact that his game blossomed in college, however, was at least indirectly a result of the school’s military regimen.

“When I first got there I was feeling a lot of stress with the way things were going, so I actually spent a lot of time in the gym, working out on my own, getting extra shots up,” Williams says. “So when I led the country in scoring, I was surprised, but I knew I’d put in a lot of hard work.”

Still, one of the knocks on Williams going into the ’08 Draft was that he was too laid-back and wasn’t aggressive enough. And it’s easy to see how some might read his smooth style as nonchalance. With his size, craftiness around the rim, and the fact that he’s not considered a great athlete — not to mention that he’s left-handed — Williams might remind you of Chris Douglas-Roberts, the New Jersey Nets’ second-year pro. Williams and CDR both shined in dribble-drive motion systems in college, only CDR was at Memphis, where he competed for national championships and had more exposure. Douglas-Roberts grew up in Detroit and has said he was greatly influenced by Jalen Rose; Williams also counts Rose as one of his basketball role models. That CDR has proven to be a double-digit scorer in the League bodes well for Williams.

“I know that I’m known as a scorer, but I want to show people I can do everything else,” Williams says. “That scorer label sticks with you, and yeah, I’m gonna score regardless. So I can average 25 a game, but I also want to get six or seven rebounds, five or six assists. I think I bring a lot more to the table.”

# Team works out D-League guard for second time

Jeremy Wise was a part of the first group of players the Kings hosted for predraft workouts last month.

And Wise was pleased to return Saturday for a second workout with the Kings.

“I was excited,” Wise said. “I felt like I did real good in the first workout. I was just happy to be back.”

Wise starred at Southern Mississippi for three seasons before spending last season playing for Bakersfield of the NBA Development League.

And with the NBA draft Thursday, Wise is the only guard to have returned for a second workout with the Kings. Wise declared for the draft last year.

He left Southern Miss after three seasons as the sixth-leading scorer in school history with 1,691 points. In Bakersfield, Wise had a solid season, averaging 16.6 points and 5.1 assists in 45 games while shooting 51.9 percent from the field. He also worked to improve as a point guard.

“Coming out of Southern Miss, that’s what I was working on,” Wise said. “I was playing more two-guard, but when I went to the D-League, I worked on my point guard skills.”

The Kings could use another guard who has the ability to score and facilitate with their second unit.

After February’s three-team trade sent Sergio Rodríguez to New York, Sacramento was thin at guard.

So when Tyreke Evans missed time late in the season because of a concussion, Beno Udrih had to play a lot of minutes because the team lacked another ballhandler.

Wise, 24, might be better equipped to help a pro team than younger guards.

He said running a pro-style offense and shooting from the NBA three-point line, where he made 37.5 percent of his attempts with Bakersfield, have helped him prepare.

“They push the ball so I feel I push the ball a fair amount,” Wise said of how he would fit in with the Kings. “That’s what I did in the D-League. I can spot-up shoot – do whatever they want me to do.”

# Basketball has become a family tradition for the Woodsides

When North Dakota State University senior Ben Woodside was a young boy in Albert Lea, his parents told him he could play whatever sport he wanted.

He started out playing hockey in fifth grade and then added basketball in sixth. For a while he played both, but then he decided to stick with basketball.

Basketball is sort of a family tradition with the Woodside family. Ben's parents, Robbi and Paul, both played basketball, and both sets of grandparents were also involved with the sport, Paul said in an interview Friday. But they always made sure to give Ben the option to let him pick whichever he wanted to do.

The proud parents reflected on their son's journey from a young Albert Lea boy who played basketball in his neighborhood park to a standout point guard at North Dakota State who has attracted the attention of the American sports world, from ESPN's "SportsCenter" to fans who root for Cinderella teams.

The parents showed pictures of Ben shooting a basketball into a plastic toy basketball hoop before he was even 5.

When he got a little older, Ben could be found practicing at what is now called Valley Park, which is just a block or two away from his house on Sheridan Street, his mother said.

"He had the ability to dribble, to go to the basket," said Paul, a physical education teacher at Halverson Elementary School. "We kind of taught him that. But to become good, you have to practice. He practiced a lot."

In fact, Paul and Robbi said, they never had to tell him to go practice; they just had to tell him to come home. He'd practice for hours at a time.

"In high school, I used to say, 'Don't you think you need to get a job?'" said Robbi, a dental hygienist. "He said, 'No, this is my job.'"

From graduation at Albert Lea High School in 2004 — where he was the first-ever three-time recipient of the Tribune's Boys' Basketball Player of the Year — Ben went on to North Dakota State.

The college team is now in its first season as a NCAA Division I competitor and has made it to the NCAA tournament.

Ben has set numerous records, including the career scoring point record at the university, NDSU's career record for free throws, and the most points scored in nine years in a single game by a player in a Division I game.

"I actually play basketball, too," Ben's seventh-grade sister, Bryn, said. "It motivates me to want to do better."

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The family said they were in the stands during the Summit League title game Tuesday. The game was the deciding factor in whether the team would play in the NCAA men's basketball tournament in its first year of eligibility.

When Ben scored the game-winning basket, Bryn said, "I started crying, I was very excited."

At least one person from the family has been there in person for about two-thirds of Ben's games, Robbi said. She figures the family puts about 10,000 miles on their car during a basketball season.

The family said they were leaning toward staying home to watch the tournament selection show tonight, though they had talked about going to watch it in person.

While there's "many things in the works right now," as far as recruitment to the NBA or another professional basketball team is concerned, right now Ben is just going to concentrate on the end of the season and the games at hand, Paul and Robbi said.

"Ben always had dreams about this stuff," Robbi said.

The parents joked they were each going to fill out at least one tournament bracket with NDSU going all the way to the finals.

# Brandan Wright tries to revive NBA career

As a 6-foot-7 freshman at Brentwood Academy, Brandan Wright had his ups and downs. There were 30-point games when he dominated opponents, but there were also games when he turned the ball over, made mental mistakes and missed shots.

The Eagles got off to a slow start that year, but rallied enough to make it to the 2003 state tournament. It was at that point when Wright stopped playing like a 15-year-old freshman.

Suddenly, he was playing for the future, which is very much akin to what he is doing today in the NBA.

As that freshman, Wright went on to lead Brentwood Academy to a decisive 68-49 victory in the championship game over Lausanne Collegiate School, which featured 2003 Tennessee Mr. Basketball and current Memphis Grizzlies star Marc Gasol. In the next three years, Wright led the Eagles to three more state titles and was named Division II Mr. Basketball three times.

He signed with North Carolina and was named ACC Tournament MVP in his lone year with the Tar Heels in 2006-07. In the NBA draft he was selected eighth by the Charlotte Bobcats, then traded the same night to the Golden State Warriors.

“I remember a couple games when he had 25 or 30 as a freshman and really played well,” said Brentwood Academy’s coach at the time, George Pitts. “But when he went up against Gasol in the state championship — just the things he did — that’s when I knew he was really something special on the court.”

Since entering the NBA, Wright, now 22, has been plagued by inconsistency and injury.

As a rookie he played in 38 games, averaging four points, 2.6 rebounds and slightly less than 10 minutes per game. In year two, his numbers nearly doubled in every category, but a shoulder injury forced him to miss 37 games.

Going into 2009-10, the Golden State staff was excited about what they saw from Wright. He said he was in the best shape of his life. But the injury problems returned and surgery to repair a torn labrum in his left shoulder forced him to miss the entire season.

The Warriors picked up an option for a fourth year on his contract last season despite the injury, but in the business that is the NBA, there comes a time when investments need to pay off.

“Every player at some point gets into, you’re playing for your future in the NBA,” Warriors’ General Manager Larry Riley said. “Unfortunately he’s had these injuries, which makes this a big year for him.”

So since April, Wright has been in Franklin, working on his game and his shoulder.

“These last eight to 10 weeks I’ve really been focusing on my upper body,” Wright said. “I’m up to 229 (pounds). I’m still working out the kinks, but I feel a lot stronger.”

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Wright has heard the criticisms that he was too skinny or not strong enough for the pro game.

“I’ve definitely been working on my body a lot,” he said. “But it’s kind of inaccurate really. You just play your style. Your game is your game. I feel like I have plenty of time to get the job done.”

Wright could have stayed in college to get stronger. 2010 would have been his senior year with the Tar Heels. He would have been a part of the team that won the NCAA Championship in 2009. He could have improved as a player.

But he instead chose to do what was not only best for him, but for those closest to him.

“There’s a lot of risk in coming back,” Wright said. “Injury, me not playing as well. It’s a big step for your family as well. There’s a lot of things you’ve got to sit around and think about. But I felt like leaving outweighed staying.

“No regrets at all.”

To this point, the Warriors won’t say they have regrets either.

“The reason for (picking up the option) was that first he’s a basketball player with a good upside, and secondly he’s a good person that you can trust to come back off of an injury,” Riley said. “I’ve never worried about one day as to what Brandan Wright’s doing or any problem that could develop around him. He’s going to do what he’s supposed to do and he’s going to be where he’s supposed to be.

“We basically threw away a year’s salary last year and got nothing back for it because we do have high hopes.”
